The Tree Council is celebrating its 50th anniversary and over the winter offered fifty golden fruit orchards to Tree Wardens and associated groups. The village of Crook of Devon were the successful applicants in our patch and will be having a planting weekend on 9th/ 10th March. If you would like to be part of this, please contact Catherine at caglloyd@pkc.gov.uk.

Tree varieties producing special golden fruit have been especially selected, including a mixture of apples: Julia's Late Golden, Paradice Gold and Golden Glow and Golden Delicious, Crab Apples: Golden Gem and Golden Hornet; Mirabelle Plums and Gages: Golden Sphere and Oullins Golden; plus an unusual, large-berried Hawthorn called 'Big Golden Star' whose fruit taste like apples! We have said no to the two apricots which were part of the mix as we suspect they would not have been hardy enough to cope with the Scottish winter, but greatly look forward to seeing the others establish and grow.



Creating a Mini Tree Nursery Tree planting or natural colonisation?

Being a Young Tree Grower

The main Tree Growers Guide has already been mentioned. There are, however, two versions of the guides. The Young Tree Growers Guide is recommended for primary and secondary school students it is available here: https://treegrowersguide.org.uk/ytgg/. However, even as an adult beginner, this guide will be useful In contrast, if you are already experienced in planting trees and already understand the basics behind growing trees, the first Tree Growers Guide would be more suitable for you to use.

If you know of any schools where we can encourage the young pupils to have an interest in growing trees, please let us know as it can also allow them to learn growing skills and contribute to their local community.

New Tree Guard-ians

Everywhere you look there are plantings of trees which have either been abandoned or are just not cared for. Many of the trees are being strangled by old tree guards or falling over because their stakes have failed or been removed.

There is an opportunity here for us Tree Wardens. First of all, we need a list of housing developments, parks or road verges where trees with failing guards or stakes need help so that permission can be gained to offer our help. Then we need an informal group of Guard-ian volunteers who can occasionally go to the trees' aid. It would just need a handful of Guard-ians to arrange half day get-togethers and hold an inventory of tools (or know where local tools could be borrowed). Tree Wardens could go out together to a local spot, or a larger group could be arranged occasionally to tackle a specific area.

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Hedgerow Survey Opportunities

Although hedgerow legislation is strong in England and Wales, it is negligible in Scotland. However, to help safeguard local native hedges, Tree Wardens are welcome to undertake their own surveys, alone or with one or two other people. There are a number of complicated survey methods for which training is essential. However, by using the PTES Healthy Hedgerows Survey, this is a quick and easy assessment which can be used both locally and nationally. More information is available here Healthy Hedgerows on paper (ptes.org), with the survey form and hedge structure key downloadable from the same page.

We are currently looking into what will be best for the training modules where hedges are concerned, but as spring gets under way, please consider starting your own hedge surveys (the best time is May through to July).

What is a Tree Warden?

There are some 200 networks of fantastic volunteer tree champions all around the UK. We are local tree champions who plant, look after and stand up for the trees in our patch. No experience in tree management is needed – just a love of trees and a few hours to spare. During 2024 Tree Council training modules will be rolled out which will be of equal help to long-term and new members.

In Perth & Kinross there will be some 25 Biodiversity Villages, Neighbourhoods and Towns set up in the next couple of years. We hope each of these settlements will have at least one, preferably two new Tree Wardens who can join our Network.



Whether you want to get your hands dirty by planting trees, raising awareness about trees in the local community, or simply be the eyes, ears and voice for the trees in your village or street, anyone can be a Tree Warden! Please join us.

These are just some of the tasks that Tree Wardens can get involved in:

- Check planning applications and alert the local authority of any veteran or mature trees which are in danger;
- Join others in measuring trees and adding the information into the Ancient Tree Inventory (it can also be a solo task if you prefer!);
- Help undertake surveys of trees for diseases and pests;
- Join in surveys of hedgerows, orchards, or invertebrates in/around trees;
- Recommend sites for tree planting in your local area:
- Seek tree planting opportunities; arrange or help with local tree planting days;
- Prune, water and give vital aftercare to local trees after planting;
- Assist with fruit tree planting and tree care in community and school orchards;
- Work with the local authority to survey or care for our precious street or graveyard trees;
- Help rejuvenate local woodlands or local housing development trees in need of management;
- Talk to as many people as possible about the value of trees;
- Take part in local events to raise awareness of what it means to be a Tree Warden.
